

Sermon Prompts, Preparation Checklists, Outreach Ideas, and Prayer Guide



Use the following suggested sermon prompts to preach John 3:16 on 3/16 for an evangelistic emphasis at your church.

"The Best News!"

by Preston L. Nix, Ph.D | New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary

Big Idea

This verse is popularly called "The gospel in a nutshell." The gospel means "good news." The gospel is not only "good news"; it's the best news you will ever hear!

The best news you will ever hear is this: by placing your faith in Jesus, all of your sins can be forgiven, you can be made right with God, and you can receive the gift of eternal life.

- God's Love and Sacrifice: "For God so loved the world in this way: He gave His one and only Son ..."
- Your Response: "... so that everyone who believes in Him ..."
- God's Promise: "... will not perish but have eternal life."

Conclusion

John 3:16 may be the most well-known verse in the New Testament, but it is not enough to simply to know what it says.

Invitation Prompt

We must act upon the truth of John 3:16, repent of our sin, believe in the gospel, and receive Jesus as our Lord and Savior.

"God's Redeeming Love"

by Dr. Robert Smith, Jr. | Samford University

Big Idea

Our loving Father was willing to stop at no cost to redeem His beloved children. Despite the gravity of our sin, He sent His Son to lay down His life for us, His sheep, that we may experience the redemption only He can provide. There is only one way to enter His promise of everlasting life: through faith in the Son. Anyone who places faith in Jesus may find true pasture, eternal rest, and loving redemption in Him alone.

- The Width of Divine Love
- · The Cost of Divine Love
- The Inclusivity of Divine Love

Conclusion

God's love is pervasive—so high we can't get over it, so low we can't get under it, so wide we can't go around it, and so inclusive we can't control it.

Invitation Prompt

We must come in through the door: Jesus (John 10:9,15-16).

"The World's True God"

by Dr. Robert Smith, Jr. | Samford University

Big Idea

Our God, the Author of truth, created the world and established Himself as the one, true God over creation. Though we have sinned and deserve death on account of our trespasses against Him, He created a way for us to experience salvation and to be reunited with Him for eternity. Through Christ's life, death, and resurrection, the work is finished, and we may be brought back into relationship with the Father.

• The Divine Creator: Creation

The Divine Deliverer: Salvation

• The Divine Convener: Consummation

Conclusion

Only one God is unbound by creation, devoted to our salvation, and awaiting the consummation of believers unto Himself. We can see God's love for us because He gave of Himself in each move—creation, salvation, and consummation—that we might have eternal life.

Invitation Prompt

"For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

"God's Extravagant Love"

Big Idea

Every extravagant gift demands a response. Never has a greater gift been given or received than the gift of salvation from God through Jesus toward us, His beloved creation. Because our loving Father lavishes such extravagant love toward us, we must respond to His generosity with the awe it deserves. Will we be apathetic toward His extravagant gift of salvation, or will we respond with the worship He is due?

- · God loved.
- · God gave.
- · We respond.

Conclusion

Respond to God's love by withholding nothing from the One who gave us His all.

Invitation Prompt

What is your response to God's great gift?

"For God So Loved the World"

Big Idea

More songs have been sung, more poems have been written, more pictures have been painted, and more movies have been made on the single subject of "love" than perhaps any other topic. Our world has always been infatuated with the concept of love, but love is misunderstood by the world. If you had to sum up the entire message of the Bible in one word, it would be love. We can view His Word as God's "love letter" to us. If you had to sum up the entire message of the Bible in one verse, it would be John 3:16.

God's eternal love for you offers you hope for this earthly life and the promise of eternal life.

- The Reality of God's Love: "For God so loved the world in this way ..."
 - God's love is perfect.
 - God's love is personal.
- The Result of God's Love: "He gave his one and only Son ..."
 - God gave us His Son.
 - God gave us a Savior.
- The Response to God's Love: "... so that everyone who believes in Him ..."
 - We must receive Christ by faith.
 - · We will reside with Christ forever.

Conclusion

God's love for us transcends our earthly struggles and calls us into an everlasting covenant with Him forever. Receive His love that is like no other.

Invitation Prompt

- Trust Christ and receive God's gift of eternal life.
- Celebrate God's love, as well as His gift of salvation, and live with hope.
- Identify someone you can share God's love with today.

"Nicodemus: An Intelligent Man Comes to Christ"

Big Idea

Scripture's account of Nicodemus shows us what it looks like to be changed by the love of Jesus Christ. The call of the gospel is to simply believe, receive, and become. Jesus met Nicodemus where he was and called him into deeper relationship with Himself. Jesus invites us to go beyond head knowledge and tradition so that we may come to Him and be truly transformed.

"The Truth of Salvation"

by D.J. Horton | Church at the Mill of Moore, South Carolina

Big Idea

Four is a big deal: four-part harmony, four legs to a table, four wheels on a car, four years for high school (and four more for college), four quarters in a football game, and four courses in fine dining. With four in mind, John 3:16 tells us four truths about salvation.

1. The Motive of Salvation: Why did He do it? John's answer: "For God so loved the world ..."

The overarching truth of salvation is that it comes from God's love. God did not have to save us. He could have fulfilled His justice and maintained His holiness by allowing all of humanity to die in their sin. Thankfully, God is love. His love for us moved Him to offer salvation and pursue a relationship with us.

2. The Means of Salvation: How did He do it? John's answer: "He gave ..."

God gave His Son fully, even to the point of death. God kept His law and loved His creation at the same time by offering what He Himself required for the forgiveness of sin, a blood sacrifice. There is no greater love.

3. The Man of Salvation: Who did He (God) give? John's answer: "... his one and only Son ..."

Jesus is unique in that He is both God and man. Being fully God and fully man allows Him to be the perfect lamb without blemish to be sacrificed for our sins. God did not spare His Son that we might have eternal life.

4. The Message of Salvation: For whom did He do it? John's answer: "... so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life."

God has offered salvation to anyone who believes. Anyone! Let me say that again: anyone!

Conclusion

God promises that His salvation is for anyone who believes. We are saved from perishing in sin, living in hell forever. We are saved to eternal life with God in a new heaven and new earth.

Invitation Prompt

- 1. Have you believed the gospel fully?
- 2. Have you made your belief public?
- 3. Does your life currently look as though Jesus is your Lord and Savior?
- 4. If the gospel is for anyone, are you willing to tell everyone?

"The Greatest Gift"

by Carl J. Bradford | Texas Baptist College

Big Idea

The greatest gift of all time—one that can never be surpassed—is God's gift of Jesus to the world. The giver, the gift, and the goal are summarized succinctly in John 3:16.

- The Giver of Love—v. 16a "For God so loved the world ..."
- The Gift of Love—v. 16b "... that He gave His only Son ..."
- The Goal of Love v. 16c "... that whoever believes in Him ..."

Conclusion

John 3:16 is more than just a declaration of words. It's the foundation of the Christian faith. It speaks of a love so great that it led to the greatest gift ever given, Jesus Christ, sent to die for us. This love is not just a historical fact but a present reality that calls for our response.

Invitation Prompt

The message of the text is clear: God loved. God gave. Will you believe? He's calling you to come. The price has already been paid, the way has already been made, and the invitation has already been extended. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, offers forgiveness, peace, and eternal life to anyone who will believe in Him.

If you have never made that decision to trust in Jesus, come. Don't wait another moment. Today is the day of salvation. The same Jesus who died for the world is reaching out personally to you right now. Come and receive the gift of eternal life that only His love provides!

□ Other Considerations

- Will we host any outreach events leading up to 3/16?
- How will we emphasize John 3:16 through our Sunday School classes or small groups?
- What follow-up steps will we provide to guests who attend services and/or respond to the gospel message on 3/16?

Block Party

Create flyers and post on social media with details about your neighborhood block party. Provide food, fun, and a faith emphasis for the gospel to be proclaimed. Let your neighbors see God's love on display through your church's willingness to be a gospel presence within your community. Distribute invitations to your church service(s) for 3:16 on 3/16.

Car Wash

Serve your community by hosting a free car wash in your parking lot. Create roadside signs to advertise this free event, declaring the truth of God's love to all who drive by. Be sure to share the gospel with everyone who stops by and have resources available for those who want to learn more about the good news of Jesus Christ. Hand out invitations to your church service(s) for 3:16 on 3/16.

City Serve Day

Mobilize your people to serve your community by meeting tangible needs. Prepare your serve teams to have gospel conversations with those they encounter as they serve. Hand out invitations to your church service(s) for 3:16 on 3/16.

Door-to-Door Campaign

Organize teams to engage your neighbors and distribute invitations to your church service(s) for 3:16 on 3/16. Give volunteers conversation starters and questions for engaging in spiritual conversations with those who may be far from Christ, as well as those who may be ready to connect with your congregation.

Spring Invite-a-Friend Emphasis

Encourage and equip your church members to invite their family and friends to hear 3:16 on 3/16. From social media posts to in-person conversation starters, prepare your congregation for spiritual dialogue about the gospel and how John 3:16 leads you to invite friends and neighbors into the truth of Christ's love.

This devotional guide encourages you to read Scripture and pray three times each day for 16 days, concluding on March 16, 2025, when John 3:16 will be preached in participating churches across our nation. There are three aspects for reading and prayer each day, taken from the first part of John 3:16: "For God so loved the world ..."

- Morning: recognize who God is as Creator and Sustainer of the universe.
- Noon: recognize the love of God, a love that has been demonstrated in the finished work of Jesus Christ.
- **Evening:** recognize the purpose of Christ's coming: to save sinners.

As you read these verses, focus on that specific aspect in the passage and allow it to guide you as you pray. May this time of reading and prayer open our eyes to these aspects of God's love for the lost and challenge us to pray for the lost in a new and compassionate way. May our prayers bring about a fruitful response to the message of the gospel.
